Just a reminder that all volunteers must obtain clearances to volunteer in the building. You can register using App Garden. This information can be found on our website under the Volunteer Clearance icon. It is recommended you do this now before an event takes place because some clearances take time to receive.

Report Cards will be given all four marking periods for students in Grades I through 5 only. In order to view your child's report card at the end of each marking period, you will need to register on the districts' PowerSchool System(SIS). You can access the system using the icon on the district or school website. The link is at the top of the website.

We need your help in keeping our students safe. The student drop-off time begins at 8:40AM. That is when there is adult supervision available. Students are expected to be in their homerooms by 9:00 AM. Please follow the traffic laws when using the car rider line. Please follow the directions of our security guard. Also, dogs are not permitted on the premises at arrival or dismissal time.

We have had an increased amount of students coming in late and leaving early. Please understand that Pennsylvania has a school code for school attendance that dictates the amount of time students need to be in school. Students are expected to be in their classrooms ready to learn at 9:00 AM. When a student comes in late they start the day playing catch up. Picking up early also disrupts the learning day for all. It is important that students attend the full day of school to ensure academic success. Penn Valley hosts two morning math clubs. 24 Challenge Club is a math game club open to students in grades 3-5 that meets every Tuesday morning from 8:15-8:45. To play the game, students must use all four numbers on any given game card along with any of the four operations to make the number 24. The first student to make 24 wins the card to gain points. The student with the most points earned wins the round.

Our second math club is Math Olympiads where students explore topics and strategies in depth and learn how to become proficient problem solvers. Club members will enter five worldwide contests between December and March. Math Olympiads is open to 4th and 5th grade students and meets Friday mornings from 8:15-8:45.




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Fact Fluency

2nd Grade

Second grade has been busy learning and growing! In reading, we've enjoyed some great stories, including Clark the Shark and Picture Day Prediction. We've learned so many new vocabulary words, and have learned patterns to help us read more challenging words. Students have learned about author's purpose and about the setting of a story. In math, students have learned many different strategies to solve addition problems. Ask a second grader to show you how to solve an addition problem using partial sums or an open number line. In writing, we spent several weeks reviewing complete sentences, subjects, predicates, end marks, and types of sentences. Currently, students are learning how to write a full paragraph with 5 complete sentences consisting of a topic sentence, 3 detail sentences, and a closing sentence. In social studies we learned about maps and communities. Soon we will begin our science unit on solids and liquids. We are excited to continue learning this year!

4th Grade

Fourth grade has had a great start to the school year. We are learning to demonstrate our best character as we understand the expectations of being a responsible, respectful and safe fourth grade learners. We love participating in our Morning Meetings together as we greet, share and get to know one another.

Our fourth grade teammates have become the experts in story elements and have applied their new knowledge when reading their first novel. We have finished our first novel, titled Frindle by Andrew Clements. We have also enjoyed reading in our Storyworks magazine. We have read fictional stories about teamwork and perseverance and also informational texts about courageous individuals who have survived Death Valley and those who have used their voice to fight for what they believe. When reading fiction, fourth grade readers have learned about characters, setting and plot and nonfiction text features and text structure when reading informational text.

In math, fourth grade friends are polishing up their basic math fact skills. We have worked on adding, subtracting and even multiplying larger numbers! Learners have practiced different strategies to find partial products and even multiply two-digit numbers using basic facts. We are working on maintaining a positive outlook when trying to solve multiple step problems. Fourth graders are learning the importance of taking their time, lining up numbers and showing our thinking in their math notebooks, step by step.

Fourth grade writers are growing more and more confident each day. Using their editing eyes, writers are checking to be sure they have capitalized letters and correctly punctuated each sentence. Writers are using resources to check their spelling. Be sure to have your 4th grader check for these at home when writing.

Fourth grade learners know they can do hard things and prove just that! They have learned that productive struggle is something we work through with a positive outlook and coping skills to learn. Keep up the great work 4th grade! You do amazing things each day to learn and grow.

5th Grade

This marking period, 5th graders have had fun getting to know one another, building community and learning to work together. We have worked on 5th grade expectations and goal-setting.

In science we finished up our Earth and Sun Unit. We learned how to use shadows to observe the rotation and revolution of the Earth. We learned that outdoor shadows can help us tell time!

Our 5th graders have been working hard and having fun! We are off to a great start this year! They have made Penn Valley proud!

Library

We began the school year with each student writing their name and favorite book on a puzzle piece. The puzzle pieces were assembled into one large puzzle outside the library. It has created a great sense of community.

Recess Readers is back. Recess Readers is offered to students in second through fifth grade once a week. Students can choose to come to the library to read during recess. The choice is made each week and does not require a long-term commitment.

Students interested in Reading Olympics will meet in November and will begin reading the Reading Olympics books. We will meet again in December and meet weekly beginning in January. The competition will be in March or April.

We started the year reviewing basic library procedures and concepts, but we have now moved on to new content at each grade level. Kindergarten students listen to several stories each week and complete an activity related to the story. First grade has been learning about how the library is organized. Second grade students can now identify and use the different parts of a book. In third grade, we learned how to search the online catalog. Fourth and fifth graders have reviewed the many databases available through the library and both grades are beginning research projects. Fourth grade students will work in small groups to research and promote books that are eligible for this year's Caldecott Award. Fifth grade students have each selected an animal to research.

Art

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Fall is a great time to explore different textures in nature. The **kindergarteners** are touching smooth leaves, bumpy tree bark, and rough sticks. We are using our observations to make watercolor paintings of trees.

The **first graders** are reviewing the art concept of "texture" that we learned last year in kindergarten. We are creating an up-close view of a fall scarecrow, complete with some feathered bird friends.

In **second grade**, we are learning about leaves. We observed that leaves have lines on them called, "veins." We discussed how people have veins too. We are drawing veins on our paper leaves using construction paper crayons.

The **third graders** are working on apple trees that shows highlights and shadows in our paintings. We are also discussing and celebrating the pollinators that we can thank for our food.

This week in **fourth grade**, we are painting a birch tree landscape with skies inspired by dutch artist, Vincent Van Gogh. As we painted, we listened to the song, "Starry, Starry Night" by Don McLean.

The **fifth grade** is studying the art element, "form." We are filling in our pumpkin drawings by blending different tints and shades of oil pastels in order to make them appear round and real.
