


Mews from the School Counselor



Are you experiencing food insecurity? Bucks County Opportunity Council (BCOC) is here to help. BCOC has a small Emergency Food Pantry at the HELP Center that is open to all community members. It is located in Bristol. Three nonprofit agencies offer services through the HELP Center: Bucks County Opportunity Council, St. Mary Medical Center, and United Way of Bucks County. Together, they use HELP as a food pantry, a distribution center, and a "shop" for brand-new essential goods. No appointment is needed, and walk-ins are able to take up to two bags of food once a week during pantry hours: Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Friday 9 am - 4 pm.

On inclement weather days, the district will notify you via phone and text. If you do not receive a phone call or text, please tune into the radio, ABC, CBS, NBC, or the district website if there is a delayed opening or school closing. Please do not rely strictly on the School Messenger system. We will be moving to a virtual learning model on a modified schedule if we have another snow day. The schedule will be sent out via email if a snow day occurs and will be posted on our website.

Mens from 3rd Grade




Happy New Year! Third Grade began the year discussing and writing about our hopes and dreams for 2024. We are wrapping up our science unit on Motion and Matter. Students had a great time making and observing the motion of twirly birds. They adapted the twirly birds to observe if and how the motion changed with additional weight or a change in the structure of the wings. Students worked with magnets and learned about magnetic fields and magnets' push and pull forces.



In math, third graders are working to master their multiplication facts, find the area of regular and irregular figures, and read and create graphs. The reading program has introduced some awesome literature this marking period. Students learned about the Constitution, why we celebrate the Fourth of July, and why the Statue of Liberty is green. Students have just begun the drama unit and are having fun reading plays, changing their voices for characters, and talking about the setting. Students are encouraged to read every night for 100 Step Challenge and increase stamina and vocabulary. We welcome Mrs. McGurrin's and Mrs. Zubrzycki's student teachers, Miss Poll and Miss Tobin! Third Graders continue to practice mindfulness and be respectful, responsible, and safe.


News from 4th Grade




The Fourth grade team reflected on the second marking period as a marking period filled with improved Writing, Math, Science and Reading! As writers, the team worked on developing our skills by "stretching" our writing with descriptive language such as metaphors, personification, and similes. We challenged our writing abilities by looking at winter scenes and then using our senses to write about what we saw. In reading, we traveled to Naomi, Florida and "spent time" making new friends with Opal, Winn Dixie, and a host of other characters in a fourth grade favorite book, titled, Because of Winn Dixie. We continued challenging our abilities by researching turtles, butterflies, and other migratory animals as we developed meaningful "Canva" presentations for each other to enjoy. Grammar has also been a slam dunk when applying our learning of nouns, verbs, helping verbs, conjunctions, and transition words.

Fourth grade mathematicians are working towards mastering our math facts, especially multiplication and division. Our focus for the first and second marking periods was to perfect addition and subtraction and work on building fluency of multiplication. Our goal for the third and fourth marking period is to master multiplication. We expanded our math vocabulary through exploration of line relationships, quadrilaterals and triangles. As we explore factorization and geometric figures, we are anticipating using these skills as we go forward in area, perimeter, and division in the upcoming months.

Our study of Science continues even as we begin Social Studies in the third marking period. We have explored magnetism, electricity, and force, but we will continue to explore our fourth grade concepts including the Solar System as we prepare for our Science PSSA in the Spring. Fourth grade is "out of this world" with the knowledge we've learned in Science. Additionally, we are learning the importance of stretching outside our reading comfort zone as we continue to read a variety of genres. Keep up the good reading practice and enjoy each book along the way! Remember that homework is an integral part of learning. Homework is designed to reinforce skills learned during the day and to help your teacher understand the concepts that you may struggle with from the day's lesson.



To round out the year, we look forward to traveling the United States in Social Studies. As we travel through the states and regions of the United States, we look to discover all there is to know about our home state of Pennsylvania and its history.

News from 5th Grade

This marking period, 5th graders have enjoyed our holiday celebrations, working with our 2nd grade buddies, working hard toward their 40 book challenge, and fun assemblies put on at PV!



In reading, we have been working hard at achieving 20 books by the end of marking period 2. We enjoyed reading Home of the Brave. We studied historical fiction, theme, and figurative language as we learned about a refugee from Sudan and his conflicts when he came to America. Many students were impressed by the author's style of writing as well as the inspiring story of Kek. We are so proud of our hard work and thinking!

In math, we have learned about long division and multiplying & dividing with decimals, and we have started learning about fractions. We have also been focusing on the quality of our math work by utilizing the acronym "EWS." E=equation with a variable, W= show work, S=sentence with a label. We have seen such an improvement in our math skills and are so proud of the students for taking on this challenge. Knowing our math facts has been integral in our success with these complex topics.



In science, we finished up our Mixtures & Solutions Unit. We learned about the differences between mixtures and solutions. We also learned about separating mixtures & solutions. It was fun to see the water evaporate from our salt water solution and see the final result: salt crystals!



Our 5th graders have been working hard and having fun! We are so excited to start the last half of their last year in elementary school! They have made Penn Valley proud!

Beginning in the third marking period, all students at Penn Valley will be researching a president in honor of Presidents Day. We will have multiple experts on ALL of our presidents from George Washington to Joe Biden. Students are enjoying selecting who they will research.

Kindergarten students continue to listen to several stories each week and complete an activity related to the story. First grade has started listening to fairy tales, and second grade students are learning about trickster tales. In third grade, students learned about how the library is organized. Mens from Gym




Since our return from winter break, we are continuing our focus on team building, decision making, communication, and sportsmanship. Students are having a blast learning new skills, practicing old skills and participating in a variety of games.

Kindergarten, 1st, and 2nd graders have been busy learning fun scooter activities, how to jump rope, and how to do different hula-hoop tricks. Students loved trying to steal flags from their classmates during a game called Mario Kart with the scooters.

Our 3rd, 4th and 5th graders have been completing individual and team cooperative challenges this month. Their teamwork skills were most recently tested during a game of Shipwreck. Four ships were wrecked in a storm and the sailors (AKA the students) needed to work together to gather all of the ship supplies that went into the ocean. I was impressed by their communication and teamwork not only with sailors from their original ship, but also with sailors from other ships as well. Each class completed the task they were given while working together, using great listening skills, and gibing positive praise to their teammates. Students also learned and demonstrated their jump rope and hula hoop skills throughout the month.

In the months of February and March, students will be learning skills used in the game of hockey, basketball and volleyball. Students will also learn gymnastics, tumbles, and rolls.







Mens from Art



Warm winter wishes from the Penn Valley Art Room! It has been a busy few months working together on creative tasks and exploring new ideas in the world of art.

<u>Kindergarten</u>- The students are celebrating the artwork of the famous Dutch painter, Piet Mondrian. We are observing the lines, shapes, and colors characteristic of his work. Our "Mr. Mondrian" paintings will celebrate his favorite shapes: squares and rectangles.

<u>First Grade</u>- The first graders are learning about the color wheel and how it teaches us "color-mixing math." We are using watercolor paint to experiment how the "primary colors" are used to make the "secondary colors."

<u>Second Grade</u>- Second grade students are exploring the work of the notable Spanish artist, Pablo Picasso. His abstract style allowed him to create unusual portraits with funny faces. Students will be exploring his style in both paintings and clay sculptures.

Third Grade- The students are learning about works of art that belong to the category called, "portraits." We now know that "portraits" are images of people, and "self-portraits" are images of yourself! Our winter characters are all bundled up for winter in cozy coats colored with markers.

Fourth Grade- The fourth graders are studying illustration. We are creating a character that is part snowman and part ice cream sundae. They will be finished with watercolor paint and colored pencil.

Fifth Grade - Fifth Grade students are exploring the art element "value." Our winter forest paintings show depth and shadow.

News from SPARX



This second half of the year, all classes are starting with a short unit on robotics - and here's what's next:

Kindergarteners will complete robotics, and soon learn about materials science and buoyancy to create boats that send messages from one place to another.

First grade learns about forces, motion, and directions, and they will be building mini golf courses that you can play at Art and Literacy and SPARK night!

Second grade will soon complete their parachute challenge, followed by learning about how plants and animals adapt to survive in their environments.

Third graders complete their bridge research, move towards a few lessons using virtual reality headsets to explore and create, and later create seed dispersal machines to help us plant real seeds to take home!

Fourth graders will learn about the human brain and create marble runs, and this will be followed by a simulated concussion experiment done with real eggs - the egg drop!

Fifth grade will be completing even more robotics missions, finishing the year learning about human interactive design, creating board games, and creating mechanisms for cardboard carnival games.
